




The Thrill of Watching Horses

Fluctuating Horse Numbers


- One hundred years ago horse numbers in Canada were estimated to be about 1 million head
- By 1998 they had dropped to 886,5000
- The numbers rose again to the highest ever estimated number of 1,092,461 in 2005
- By 2010 that number had dropped again to 963,500



Economic Benefits of the Horse Industry in Canada

- The horse industry contributes just over 19 million dollars annually to the economy of Canada
- The horse industry supports about 154,000 jobs both on and off farm

Horse Use in Canada

The Oversupply of Horses

- *The aging baby boomers are downsizing their herds resulting in large numbers of horses for sale
- *Horses are remaining healthy and active into their geriatric years
- *Societal aversion to horse slaughter and the U.S. ban results in lack of disposal options

Oversupply of Horses (cont'd)

- *Declining rural population results in fewer homes for horses
- *Indiscriminate and uncontrolled breeding results in large numbers of low value horses
- *Inadequate and improper training methods results in horses with behavior or ability issues that are difficult to sell

Pecreasing Pemand for Horses

- *Decreasing size of generations subsequent to the Baby Boomers resulting in less potential horse owners
 - *In 2010 the median age of horse owners was 50 to 59 years
 - *24% of all horse owners were 60 years of age or olders

Decreasing Demand (cont'd)

- *Small rural population reduces the opportunity for involvement with horses
- *Increased choices for recreational pursuits
- *Increased emphasis on sedentary indoor activities

Decreasing Demand (cont'd)

- *The cost of horse ownership has risen sharply in the last decade
 - *In 2010 estimated to be between \$2,700 and \$5000 annually
- *Lack of disposable income during times of economic stress impacts the ability to care for a horse

Creation of Unwanted Horses

- *Cost of horse ownership especially in times of economic instability
- *Indiscriminate breeding practices leading to low value offspring
- *Uninformed horse owners practicing poor management
- *Lack of affordable and accessible end of life options

Solutions

*Provide useful and productive lives for unwanted horses that already exist

*Emphasize the need to prevent the creation of more unwanted horses.

Existing Horses

- 1. Retraining and repurposing of horses in to new careers
 - * Unwanted Horse Coalition in the U.S.
 - * Five R Program of Equine Canada
 - * National and local programs to retrain and repurpose Thoroughbred and Standardbred race horses

Existing Horses

- 2. Promote recreational involvement with horses rather than high end competition
- 3. Emphasize the wellness and physical aspect of involvement with horses
- 4. Education and awareness for new horse owners with minimal experience

Reducing New Numbers

- 1. Stop irresponsible breeding
- 2. The promotion of castration of colts prior to breeding age
- 3. Provide quality education for equine service providers
- 4. Well trained and knowledgeable law enforcement officers
- 5. New owner legislation
- 6. Dealing with end of life issues
